Laser (Standard), Laser Radial, Club 420 SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

1 RULES

- 1.1 The regatta will be governed by:
 - a) The rules as defined in the Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS)
 - b) Laser and Club 420 Class Rules
 - c) US Sailing SafeSport Handbook
- 1.2 The following RRS optional rule will apply:
 - Appendix V1 Penalty at the Time of an Incident, and Appendix V2 Penalty Taken After a Race, will apply.
- 1.3 The following RRS are changed:
 - a) RRS 64.4 (b) is changed to require a hearing before any action is taken.
 - b) RRS 61.1(a) is changed so that "A boat intending to protest about an incident that occurs in the racing area shall notify the Race Committee (RC) finish boat of her intention as soon as possible after finishing, without consultation with instructors, coaches or support persons, including (if possible) the boat identification number of the boat(s) being protested."
 - c) Competitors are required to wear a face cover during a protest hearing. This modifies RRS 63.1.
 - d) Oral changes to the Sailing Instructions may be made on the water per RRS 90.2(c) by hoisting Code Flag L on the Signal Vessel.

2 NOTICES TO COMPETITORS

Notices will be posted on the event webpage and sent via group text to registered coaches and support boats. Coach boats and support vessel shall be registered for the regatta through the event webpage.

3 SCHEDULE OF RACES

- 3.1 As many races as possible are scheduled.
- 3.2 The racing schedule is as follows:

- 3.3 Flag A displayed, with no sound, while boats are finishing means no more racing for the day.
- 3.4 No warning signal will be made after 1530 on August 8, 2020.

4 RACING AREA

The racing area will be within Captain Harbor or South in Long Island Sound (LIS).

5 THE COURSES

- 5.1 The courses shall be a Triangle or a Windward-Leeward-Windward as listed in SI Appendix A.
- 5.2 For all courses the starting and finishing lines, including the marks that bound them, are an obstruction except when starting or finishing. Boats shall not pass through the line on the leeward leg.
- 5.3 The identifying letter of the course to be sailed will be displayed from the RC signal boat before or with the warning signal for each class.

6 MARKS

- 6.1 Rounding marks will inflatable balls or tetrahedrons.
- 6.2 The offset mark for course W will be an inflatable ball.

7 THE START

7.1 Races will be started using Appendix U, "Audible-Signal Racing System." This replaces RRS 26.

- 7.2 A boat starting later than two minutes after her starting signal will be scored Did Not Start (DNS) without a hearing. This changes RRS A5.
- 7.3 The starting line will be between a staff displaying a flag on the race committee signal boat on the starboard end and the course side of a race committee boat displaying a flag or a starting mark at the port and
- 7.4 A series of short sounds will be used to call attention just before each warning signal.
- 7.5 Boats whose warning signal has not been made shall avoid the starting area during the starting sequence for other races.

8 RECALLS OF OCS BOATS

- 8.1 When an individual recall is signaled, the RC will attempt to hail the sail numbers of all boats that are OCS. This changes RRS 29.1.
- 8.2 If code flag "I" and/or "Z" and/or "U" or the black flag has been displayed, the RC will attempt to hail the sail number(s) of boats on the course side of the starting line during the minute before her starting signal.
- 8.3 Failure of the RC's amplification system, the order of the hails, or failure of a boat to hear her number hailed shall not be grounds for a boat to request redress. This changes RRS 62.1.

9 THE FINISH



The finishing line will be between a committee boat displaying a flag on the port end and a flag on the starboard end.

10 TIME LIMITS

- 10.1 Time limits for the first boat in each class to finish shall be 60 minutes.
- 10.2 Boats failing to finish within 35 minutes after the first boat in their class sails the course and finishes will be scored Time Limit Expired (TLE) without a hearing. They shall receive points equal to the number of boats finishing before the time limit expired plus 2 points, but not worse than DNF. This changes RRS 35, 63.1, A4 and A5.

11 PROTESTS AND REQUESTS FOR REDRESS

- 11.1 The Protest Committee requires that "Three Minute Justice" system set forth in SI Appendix B will be used. This changes RRS 63.2 & 63.6.
- 11.2 Competitors are required to wear a face cover/gaiter/buff during a protest hearing. This modifies RRS 63.1.
- 11.3 Scores posted online will be preliminary unless otherwise noted. Requests for redress or scoring inquiries must be received via email to racecommittee@riversideyc.org by 1800 on August 8, 2020. This changes RRS 62.2.

12 SCORING

- 12.1 As many races as possible are scheduled. One race is required to constitute a regatta.
- 12.2 When fewer than six (6) races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores. When six (6) to nine (9) races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her worst score. When ten (10) or more races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her two worst scores.

13 SAFETY REGULATIONS

- 13.1 On the way to the racing area all competitors must sail or tow upwind through the on-the-water safety gate to check-in. The Safety Boats will be designated with orange safety flags marked with an S.
- 13.2 A boat that retires from a race shall notify a RC boat before leaving the racing area.

14 SUPPORT VESSELS

- 14.1 Instructors, coaches and other support persons and spectators shall stay outside areas where boats are racing from the time of the preparatory signal for the first class to start until all boats have finished or retired, or the race committee signals a postponement or abandonment. Coaching is not permitted after a general recall.
- 14.2 Coaches and support personnel shall monitor the race committee VHF channel #69 and follow any safety instructions issued by the race committee.
- 14.3 Coaches and support boats will monitor VHF channel #69 for the coaches meeting as described in the schedule.

15 TRASH DISPOSAL

Trash may be placed aboard support or official boats. Water refill stations will be available on RYC safety boats and race committee.

16 RADIO COMMUNICATION

Except in an emergency, a boat shall neither make radio transmissions while racing nor receive radio communications of any kind. This restriction also applies to mobile telephones and any other wireless devices.



SAILING INSTRUCTIONS: APPENDIX B Three Minute Justice

1 REQUIREMENTS

The success of this system relies on competitors to take personal responsibility for improving not only their racing, but for also helping to support and improve the overall event and the sport. This means that the competitors are willing to accept the limitations of any system for the good of the whole, and are willing to work on and off the water to help improve themselves and support their fellow competitors and the event volunteers.

2 ON THE WATER JURY SYSTEM

- 2.1 The system requires an on-water PC of one to three people who are knowledgeable about the rules and who can make decisions within the context and limitations present. The "Three Minute Justice" system enables one competitor to protest another with a short hearing and immediate decision after the race.
- 2.2 The PC will be on the water in a separate, anchored or roving boat displaying a Judges flag.

3 DECISION TREE

- 3.1 Two or more boats are involved in a rules dispute during a race and one boat (Protestor) decides to protest another boat (Protestee).
- 3.2 Per SI 12.2, competitors are required to wear a face cover/gaiter/buff during a protest hearing.
- 3.3 The RC or their delegate will notify the Protestee that a protest has been filed.
- 3.4 As soon as practical, and before either involved team starts another race, the PC will hold a "Three Minute Justice" hearing:
 - a) One representative competitor from the Protestor and Protestee will tie on to the jury boat (which may be a signal boat).
 - b) At this time, the Protestor can withdraw his protest without penalty.
 - c) Once the competitors get on the boat and the hearing has begun, the Protestor has one minute to explain the reason for his protest.
 - d) The Protestee has one minute to explain his position.
 - e) The PC may dismiss the two competitors (competitor boats must be standing by) and will deliberate and reach a decision in 1 minute.
 - f) The decision of the PC is final and cannot be appealed.
- 3.5 The PC will notify the RC of the results of the hearing. The PC will also notify the Protestor and Protestee of the result.
- 3.6 In order to work with the sailors in a cooperative manner, the PC will be available between races to talk to competitors about the decision as practical.
